WSIS + 10 = ?

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- Two World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) events
 - Convened by the United Nations in 2003 (Geneva) and 2005 (Tunis)
- Outcomes
 - “Geneva Plan of Action” and the “Tunis Agenda for the Information Society”
 - “WSIS Targets” (2003); “WSIS Action Lines” (2005) to coordinate efforts to achieve these targets
 - Call for the creation of the IGF
 - Call for Enhanced Cooperation between stakeholders
- Various UN bodies and agencies involved in implementation
 - CSTD, ITU, UNESCO, etc.

- WSIS outcomes primarily focused on
 - Development
 - Access
 - Addressing the “digital divide”
- ...but Internet governance issues have served as a lightning rod
 - Historic resource distribution
 - Concerns about certain state or private actors



- RIPE NCC and I* colleagues have been involved since first WSIS events
 - The “Internet Pavilion” at WSIS in 2005
- Long-standing technical community policy-making model (bottom-up, open, transparent) ≈ “multistakeholder” model
 - Having that recognised in WSIS an important achievement
 - IGF an important and valuable mechanism for building communication and understanding across stakeholder groups

- 10-year review of the WSIS processes, conducted by the UN General Assembly
 - Will assess progress and developments in relation to the WSIS Targets and WSIS Action Lines
 - Will include discussion (decision?) on the future of the IGF
 - Will affect UN-related and other governmental activity and priorities in the Internet space

- A High Level Event (HLE) will take place in New York this December

[Caveat: We know there are unknowns, both known and unknown]

- We strongly support the continued multistakeholder approach to the issues identified by WSIS
- We agree that development and access should be the focus of WSIS efforts
 - There have been many successes (often via multistakeholder initiatives); much still to do
- We have the processes and structures to address Internet governance
 - The IGF is one of those structures, and should continue

- Working closely with all stakeholders over the coming months
 - Technical community, I*
 - Governments and the public sector
 - Civil society
- Follow developments in terms of how we can officially participate
- Produce information to support our positions
 - The important contributions of technical community to development, access
 - The progress being made on IANA stewardship transition
